

From the East



At the April Stated Meeting, we heard a full and favorable report on one of our applicants, Henry Peña. We balloted on his application, and he received an unanimous vote. So, we initiated him on April 20. Junior Warden Andrew Litfin did his usual top-notch work serving as Master for the conferral.

I first met Henry at our Annual Installation of Officers, back on December 8. Installation is a busy time, especially when you're the incoming Master. Everybody wants to say something, wish you well, or ask a question. So I did not have much time at that moment to visit with Henry. But I did get to know him. Even though he was not yet a member of the lodge, or even an applicant, he stayed late and helped with the clean-up. And he worked as hard as the rest of us. Now that is the kind of man I want to welcome as a new member of our lodge.

Mother's Day

Mother's Day is on Sunday, May 14 this year. Mother's Day is the invention of Ann Maria Reeves Jarvis (1832—1905). She was a social activist and community organizer during and after the Civil War era. She did not live to see her special day become a holiday. But her daughter, Ann Maria Jarvis (1864—1948) took the baton and ran with it. On May 10, 1908, three years after her mother's death, Jarvis held a memorial ceremony to honor her mother and all mothers at Andrews Methodist Episcopal Church, today the International Mother's Day Shrine, in Grafton, West Virginia

In 1908, the U.S. Congress rejected a proposal to make Mother's Day an official holiday. Jarvis's home state of West Virginia adopted Mother's Day as a local holiday in 1910. By 1911 all U.S. states (of which there were 46 at the time) observed the holiday, some of them officially recognizing Mother's Day. Finally, in 1914, Woodrow Wilson signed a proclamation designating Mother's Day, held on the second Sunday in May, as a national holiday to honor mothers.

Jarvis also selected the "official" flower of Mother's Day, the carnation. She said, "Its whiteness symbolizes the truth, purity and broad-charity of mother love; its fragrance, her memory, and her prayers. The carnation does not drop its petals, but hugs them to its heart as it dies, and so, too, mothers hug their children to their hearts, their mother love never dying. When I selected this flower, I was remembering my mother's bed of white pinks."

Like most holidays, Mother's Day soon became commercialized by the confection, floral, and greeting card industries. To this trend, Jarvis commented, "A printed card means nothing except that you are too lazy to write to the woman who has done more for you than anyone in the world. And candy! You take a box to Mother—and then eat most of it yourself. A pretty sentiment."

Everybody has a mother. You don't get a life on earth without her participation. Thanks to modern health care and nutritious food, most mothers are around well into your adulthood. They support and love you even when life's challenges and growing pains make you hard to deal with. For a few mothers, their final act was giving birth to you.

The best gift of gratitude you can give your Mom is to spend time with her. If a physical visit is impractical, an unrushed telephone call is the next best thing. A personal note: I haven't been able to visit or talk to my mother for 60 years. But I have ample evidence of her commitment to hard work, education, family, and investing for the future. I hope she would be proud of my efforts to continue her legacy.

What's the plan?

A few members have asked me whether we will have a Master's trip and other social events this year. The answer is yes. But to be honest, I am focused on rebuilding our officer corps and degree team so we are able to confer degrees whenever our candidates are ready and without outside assistance. We have good men, just not enough of them. We get a new one, then we lose an existing one. It's not their fault. They have lives to live and families to raise. Friendship lodge will survive. Still, I want it to thrive.

Speaking of Masonic degrees, we look forward to two more First Degrees in May. How about coming out to welcome the newest members of your lodge? Can you spare an evening?

Sometimes, brothers on the sidelines give prompts. And sometimes, that works out OK. Other times, the brother says the wrong thing, either because he was not following closely, or his memory is also imperfect. That results in confusion for the brothers doing the ritual. Then if two brothers try to help, but each one says something different. More confusion. It's natural for a Mason to spontaneously assist a brother. You just must be mindful whether your action is boosting or busting.




