Our Inspector, Wor. Dinesh Chhabra, is calling for lodge officer ritual proficiencies during the month of September. Here is what he is looking for:

2024 Senior Deacon Sean O'Hara — 1st degree: Prayer over the candidate at center, 2nd degree: Middle chamber lecture, 3rd degree: Prayer over the candidate at altar.

2024 Junior Warden Ronald Rebong — Opens the lodge on the 1st degree, administers the obligation, gives the Master's lecture, and closes the lodge. He must also complete at least one LMCP course.

2024 Senior Warden Andrew Litfin — Opens the lodge on the 2nd degree, administers the obligation, gives the Master's lecture, and closes the lodge. He must also complete at least two LMCP courses.

2024 Worshipful Master Gilbert Cruz — Opens the lodge on 3rd degree, administers the obligation, gives the 2nd section prayer, gives the Master's lecture, congratulates the candidate, and closes the lodge. Gilbert has already completed all four LMCP courses.

Lodge Management Certification Program

The Lodge Management Certification Program (LMCP) courses have been prepared by California Masons, for California Masons. They will help prepare you for leadership in your lodge. They are designed to give you the basic knowledge you will need to help manage the business administration of your lodge.

These courses are free of charge. Any Master Mason can take them. All you need is an iMember account, and a little time and interest.

To access the LMCP program, log into iMember, go to My Portal > Education, and scroll down to the LMCP courses. Choose a course and click Study Guide. You can read the Study Guide online as well as download a digital copy.

When you are ready to test your knowledge, click Take Exam. 70% is a passing score. You can retake the exam as many times as you wish. Your highest score is shown. I suggest you keep studying and testing until you score 100%.

The Reverend's Corner



In C. S. Lewis's classical book, *The Screwtape Letters*, Wormwood, a demon apprentice, must secure the damnation of a young man who's just become a Christian. He seeks the advice of an experienced devil, his uncle Screwtape. Their correspondence offers invaluable—and often humorous—insights on temptation, pride, and the ultimate victory of faith over evil forces.

[The demon Screwtape writes:] The humans live in time, but our Enemy (God) destines them to eternity. He (God) therefore, I believe, wants them to attend chiefly to two things, to eternity itself, and to that point of time which they call the Present.

For the Present is the point at which time touches eternity. Of the present moment, and of it only, humans have an experience analogous to the experience which our Enemy (God) has of reality as a whole; in it alone freedom and actuality are offered them.

He (God) would therefore have them continually concerned either with eternity, which means being concerned with Him, or with the Present, either meditating on their eternal union with, or separation from, Himself, or else obeying the present voice of conscience, bearing the present cross, receiving the present grace, giving thanks for the present pleasure.

Our (the demons') business is to get them (humanity) away from the eternal, and from the Present. With this in view, we sometimes tempt a human—say a widow or a scholar—to live in the Past. But this is of limited value, for they have some real knowledge of the past and it has a determinate nature and, to that extent, resembles eternity. It is far better to make them live in the Future. Biological necessity makes all their passions point in that direction already, so that thought about the Future inflames hope and fear. Also, it is unknown to them, so that in making them think about it we make them think of unrealities.

In a word, the Future is, of all things, the thing least like eternity. It is the most completely temporal part of time—for the Past is frozen and no longer flows, and the Present is all lit up with eternal rays.

The present time, not the future nor the past, is the time for me to contemplate and prepare myself to meet the Great Architect of the Universe.

Checking our lodge's member information, we see that 17 members still have not paid their 2023 dues. Dues this year are \$108.50. If you have an iMember account, you can log in and pay online.

What happens when a member is dealing with difficult times and cannot afford to pay dues? That brother should contact the Master of the Lodge, inform him of the situation, and request a remission. Your request is always confidential. You will remain a member in good standing, but you are excused from paying dues for the current calendar year.

Why ask for a dues remission rather than just skipping your payment? About one-half a member's dues goes to pay the Grand Lodge per capita tax. That is the money Friendship Lodge pays annually to the Grand Lodge of California. The amount we pay is based on the number of lodge members. But the Grand Lodge does not count those members whose dues have been remitted. Thus, a dues remission saves the lodge about \$57.00 for each member. Both the member and the lodge benefit.
