Do I Show Up?

Showing up is the simplest yet most impactful way I've found to contribute to the Lodge. Whether it's attending a stated meeting, supporting a degree conferral, or simply being present for a brother who needs encouragement, I've learned that my presence matters. I remember times when I thought, "Will it make a difference if I'm there?" The answer, I've discovered, is always yes. Being present shows commitment—not just to the Lodge but to the principles of Masonry and the brothers who stand beside me.

Do I Share My Knowledge?

Early in my Masonic journey, I didn't think I had much to share. I was new, still learning, and felt unqualified to offer guidance. But as I grew, I realized that each of us has something valuable to contribute, whether it's an insight from our own experiences or simply the willingness to help a brother learn a ritual or master a lesson. Sharing knowledge isn't just about teaching—it's about connecting, inspiring, and ensuring that the wisdom of the Craft is passed on. Now, I take pride in mentoring newer brothers, not because I have all the answers, but because I've come to understand how much of Masonry is built on this exchange of knowledge.

Do I Wait to Be Asked?

I'll admit, there were times when I waited for someone to ask me to get involved. I thought, "If they need me, they'll let me know". But Masonry has taught me that the Craft thrives when we take initiative. Whether it's volunteering to help with a degree, washing dishes in the kitchen, or simply asking, "What can I do to help?" I've learned that waiting to be asked often means missing out on opportunities to contribute. Now, I try to anticipate where I can be useful and act without hesitation.

Do I Have to Be Reminded?

This was a humbling lesson for me. Early on, I learned that I should not have to be reminded—whether it was paying dues, attending a practice, or completing a task I had committed to. But I've come to realize that being a Mason means taking responsibility, not just for my own actions but for the good of the Lodge. When I fulfill my obligations without needing reminders, I'm not just meeting expectations—I'm honoring the trust my brothers have placed in me.

What Participation Has Taught Me

Participation in Masonry has taught me more than I ever expected. It's shown me the value of being present, of sharing what I've learned, and of taking initiative. It's taught me that the Lodge isn't just a place we meet—it's a living, breathing community that thrives on the contributions of its members. And most importantly, it's shown me that through participation, I can not only grow as a man but also help my brothers grow and ensure that the light of Masonry continues to shine brightly.




